Nine of these questions are a sentence with one blank and four choices, and one is a plain question. Pick the best fit, mark it, and keep going. The answer key with explanations starts after question 10, so do all 10 before you look. No timer. On the real exam you get 45 seconds per question, so if you want a challenge, give yourself 8 minutes for the set.

What your score means

0 to 4 correct

The US History I CLEP is mostly names, acts, and dates, plus the reason behind each one, and a score in this range usually means the names are not there yet. Ten questions is a sample, not a diagnosis. Take Round 2 on the page linked at the end before you decide how much work is ahead of you.

5 to 7 correct

This is where most people land on a first pass. Close enough to the line to be worth studying for, and not close enough to walk in cold. Take Round 2 and see if the number holds.

8 to 10 correct

You know the names and dates. Keep in mind that the real exam leans on cause and effect, asking why an act passed or what a treaty changed, and it gives you 45 seconds a question. Take Round 2, then put your study time into the 1800s, where about 70% of the questions live.

Answer Key

1. A Appalachians

The Proclamation of 1763 forbade settlers from moving west of the Appalachians, and was supposed to appease the Indians, who were constantly attacking settlers and costing England a lot of money.

2. B resources

The Union had a three-to-one advantage in manpower, had highly developed industry, and a system of railroads.

3. C Fugitive

The Fugitive Slave Law, which was strengthened under the Compromise of 1850, was designed to return blacks in the north who had run away from the south as slaves.

4. D Roanoke

Roanoke; when English returned, every member of the colony was gone, without a single trace.

5. D Missouri

The Kansas-Nebraska Act, introduced by Senator Douglas, created the Kansas and Nebraska territories. It also repealed the Missouri Compromise, which would have forbidden slavery in those territories.

6. A Christian

The Puritans settled Massachusetts with the intent of creating a model Christian community. Religious freedom was a secondary reason.

7. C downturn

Andrew Jackson issued the Specie Circular, requiring gold or silver as payment for federal land--soon after he did this, there was a depression.

8. D Potomac

The National Road was financed by the federal government.

9. A Napoleon

The Louisiana Purchase effectively doubled the size of the United States.

10. C War Hawks

The War Hawks were led by Henry Clay and John Calhoun.
